

From your Interim Moderator

Dear All,

Many would see the piece in the Ayrshire Post (06.03.19) about the state of the churches in South Carrick. There was an element of the sensational about the reporting – ‘no one home’, ‘without a minister’, ‘crisis facing kirk congregations’ – as if God had deserted the churches in the area. The fact is that various arrangements have been put into place, which mean that every congregation is alive and worshipping God on a Sunday morning at the appointed time.

Of course, it would be foolish to deny that there are problems in the national church. There is a shortage of trained ministers, congregations are falling in number and consequently it becomes more difficult to meet the financial demands of running a church, the average age of members is rising, and it becomes more difficult to find people to fill the necessary offices. It would be foolish to deny that there is a challenge.

Through the Presbytery the General Assembly has decreed that the number of ministers in South Carrick area should fall from 7 to 5. This will inevitably lead to readjustments among the

South Carrick churches, but Ballantrae linked with St Colmon is in the fortunate position of having authority from Presbytery to call a minister. Your Nominating Committee is working hard to make this possible.

In the meantime, churches need to develop strategies to deal with a vacancy or with the long-term prospect of not having a minister. This means, at the same time, being more self-sufficient and looking after each other.

One of the significant developments in recent years has been the rise in the number of people who have been trained to lead worship. Worship Teams can be deployed at all our centres of worship and are a clear indication of the desire to support ourselves when ministers are scarce.

Congratulations are in order to those who have recently completed their Worship Team training – George McArdle, Cathy Thorburn, Mary Stirling, Susan Fairbairn and Gavin Fairbairn. Of course, not everyone feels suited or comfortable being a worship leader, but anyone who is interested in the Presbytery of Ayr's training programme should speak to me or to one of the Session Clerks.

The other main area of self-support is in pastoral care. Through their districts the Elders should be able to keep in touch with members and their well-being, but it is mostly by word of mouth that information is passed on. Evening meetings, from the Guild to Food and Fellowship, are invaluable in keeping people informed of how others are, so that everyone is included in the family of the church, and at the same time the church reaches out in mission.

Paul reminds the Ephesians (4:1-16) that individuals are called to different tasks in the church, and each role is appreciated and needed. The objective is to 'equip God's people for work in his service' – and that points further to the hope that we will find 'the full stature of Christ'.

The Ayrshire Post may despair of the church in South Carrick – but we don't!

Dear Friends,

It will not have escaped your attention that we are currently living through a time of tumultuous change in the United Kingdom’s relationship with the European Union.

Across the country this change is having, and will continue to have, a profound impact on individual lives within our congregations and our communities.

I am increasingly struck by the need within our communities for space to come together, to listen, to reflect and pray, to learn from and celebrate one another.

This period has the potential to create division and distress amidst the uncertainty of what happens next. I believe that there is a place for the Church to work for hope, unity and peace. That is why, as the UK’s planned departure from the European Union approaches, I am inviting congregations to open their doors, in partnership with other local churches and congregations, to provide spaces of welcome, and reflection: spaces in which our communities might come together and demonstrate hope in the face of uncertainty, belonging instead of rejection, and a joy in one another that surpasses our disagreements or political differences.

What this invitation might look like in practice will differ according to the unique character and context of each of the communities who choose to take it up.

Hopefully these things together show some of the small but significant ways in which we the Church can offer spaces of welcome, spaces of hope, spaces of joy and spaces of belonging in this time of uncertainty.

As the body of Christ, the Church exists beyond human borders; our calling to live out the generous love of God in our communities, in our country, in Europe and beyond remains, steadfast and unchanged. May I invite you to be particularly mindful of this over the coming, and significant, days and weeks in the life of the country.

The aim is that the women's socio-economic status is improved and their chances of future employment increase. By selling the produce made at the Centre the plan is that when the funding finishes the project will be self-sustainable – able to continue to improve the lives of women in Malawi.

Thank you to everyone for raising £80 for the work of the Leprosy Mission, making this up to £160 as the UK government is doubling every donation made.

#### **Ballantrae Finance Report**

Income sadly again this year has dropped with a fall from the previous year from £51,000 down to £43,000. Donations were up slightly, however with no legacies this year it does not make great reading.

Individual donations and wedding income assisted us greatly.

The tax returned on Gift Aid which is very well managed by Jillian Nelson provided us with £2,799 raised in the last financial year.

Costs were down, mainly as a result of not having a minister, and therefore we do receive a reduction in the stipend fee. However, the main change is the amount spent by the Malawi team in the last year due to not having a minister in the parish we were not sending regular funds. This has now altered, and they now have a minister, and this has resumed.


Income from investments was £7,075 and we spent £21,000 on the fabric of the building, including making the Manse meet Presbytery requirements. We expect to spend around £17,500 in this coming year.

To all who have provided funds in any way; gift aid, free will offering, plate, donations of money, goods and services and reviewing the church accounts, I thank you for your valiant efforts for last year and for future years.
